LIVING IN AN URBAN FOREST – At 7 p.m. on May 10th Robert Reid, Monterey’s Urban Forester, will speak to the New Monterey Neighborhood Association on the subject of living in an urban forest. Monterey’s urban forest contributes greatly to our quality of life. Trees conserve energy, help clean the air, and provide a home for wildlife

Monterey is a Tree City. To qualify, a community must have a board or department that oversees tree issues, a tree ordinance, a comprehensive community forestry program, and an Arbor Day observance.

Mr. Reid will discuss tree care, tree trimming, the tree ordinance and the City’s forestry program. Don’t miss this interesting program!

CRIME REPORT – Police officers representing our neighborhood Community Policing Team met with just twelve citizens at Scholtze Park Center last month to update us on police activity in New Monterey. Sergeant Frank Russo, Officers Ethan Andrews and Ron Blair ran thru the statistics for the last six plus months. Of 244 reported incidents, most involved vehicle burglary (forced entry) and property theft (no forced entry) from vehicles. These are opportunistic crimes where someone spots something in the vehicle and takes it. The officers pointed out that if we don’t leave anything visible in our cars, and lock them, we can usually avoid these crimes.

There were 23 stolen property crimes in homes. No other category stood out, except for traffic enforcement. Your dues will be compensated in perpetuity just by avoiding a citation for failure to stop and speeding, and the locations for heightened compliance are at David and Pine (stop sign) and Prescott and Cypress (speeding). Citations during the period numbered 44 stops, 27 speeds, 25 cell phone use, 23 seat belts, and 20 accidents, most of which were on Hawthorne Street. Extra caution, please, at Irving.

The officers reminded the audience that it is now the law that if your wipers are on, your headlights must also be on. A professional truck driver there mentioned that it is critical that we make ourselves visible, especially to big rigs, in our defensive driving efforts.

NIP projects inn design:

- Prescott sidewalk (Taylor to Seaview) the conceptual plan is complete for the full length of the project. Staff is working on alignment of the new southeast corner of Devisadero/Prescott. There is funding for concrete sidewalk, handicap ramps at corners, and neighborhood entry planter at Devisadero. June construction.
- Hoffman Park design approved by Parks & Recreation Commission April 15. The concept plan reduces the parking lot size, relocates the CERT storage container closer to the corner of Archer & Hoffman, and creates a community garden with about a dozen garden plots that will be offered by lottery to residents of New Monterey once built. There is money to move the CERT box at this time. Future funding will be required to create the planting areas.

AREA PLAN UPDATE – The area plan update was removed from the Planning Commission work plan by City staff. But one of your Board members made a presentation to the Planning Commission and our area plan update is back on the work plan.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER TO RETIRE – After 23 years of service, Cathi Cristobal will retire this month to spend more time with her grandchild. We have very little trouble with nuisance animals due largely to the responsible pet owners in residence and the effective action of Officer Cristobal over these many years.

ANIMAL ORDINANCES – Please be aware of these Code items:

- Dog running free: \$100 fine first offense
- Dog feces: \$100 fine first offense
- No dog license: \$100 first offense
- Barking dog: \$50 first offense

LIGHTHOUSE BUS RAPID TRANSIT PROGRAM FUNDED –

On December 16, 2009, President Barack Obama signed the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2010. Within the bill was a \$2.77 million appropriation for Monterey-Salinas Transit (MST) for its Bus Rapid Transit program on the Monterey Peninsula. The federal funding will be matched by \$700,000 in California Proposition 1B Transportation Bond funds, which were approved state-wide by voters in 2006.

The 6.75 mile \$3.5 million project will fund improvements along the Fremont/Lighthouse corridor, including new shelters, “smart” signals at intersections that will be coordinated along the corridor to improve traffic flow, curb expansions, sidewalk improvements and wheelchair accessible ramps at bus stops, and electronic real-time bus arrival/departure signs connected to MST vehicles via Global Positioning System (GPS). The “smart” signals will help improve traffic flow for buses as well as cars throughout the corridor. For example, if a bus is running late, signals will stay green slightly longer than their normal cycle times so that MST vehicles can proceed through intersections in order to get back on schedule. The new electronic passenger information signs will tell customers waiting at stops exactly how long until the next bus will arrive. And, at key intersections, MST buses will have special lanes in which to bypass traffic congestion, providing a high quality transit experience along the corridor.

Coupled with these infrastructure improvements will be enhancements to the operations and scheduling of the transit lines that serve the Fremont/Lighthouse corridor. What is now a nearly one hour trip from residential areas in upper Seaside to work locations on Cannery Row and the Aquarium on two buses with a transfer in downtown Monterey will be replaced with a quicker “one-seat-ride” on a single Bus Rapid Transit vehicle.

Bus travel times through the corridor are expected to improve by 50%. Frequency would increase from every 15-30 minutes to every 10-15 minutes.

The main purpose of the project is to provide a single-seat express transit service between the residential areas of Seaside and the commercial areas of Downtown Monterey, Cannery Row, and the Lighthouse District. The project will utilize existing bus stops on Lighthouse at Irving, Hoffman, and Reeside.

Construction is expected to begin in late 2010 with operation expected to begin in late 2011.



DISASTER PREPAREDNESS – China’s tragic magnitude 6.9 earthquake on April 13 and the recent devastating earthquakes in Haiti, Chile, Mexico, and elsewhere have many wondering if this earthquake activity is unusual. Scientists say 2010 is not showing signs of unusually high earthquake activity. Since 1900, an average of 16 magnitude 7 or greater earthquakes — the size that seismologists define as major — have occurred worldwide each year. Some years have had as few as 6, as in 1986 and 1989, while 1943 had 32, with considerable variability from year to year.

With six major earthquakes striking in the first four months of this year, 2010 is well within the normal range. Furthermore, from April 15, 2009, to April 14, 2010, there have been 18 major earthquakes, a number also well within the expected variation. “While the number of earthquakes is within the normal range, this does not diminish the fact that there has been extreme devastation and loss of life in heavily populated areas,” said USGS Associate Coordinator for Earthquake Hazards Dr. Michael Blanpied.

Though the recent earthquakes are not unusual, they are a stark reminder that earthquakes can produce disasters when they strike populated areas, especially areas where the buildings have not been designed to withstand strong shaking. What can you do to prepare? Scientists cannot predict the timing of specific earthquakes. However, families and communities can improve their safety and reduce their losses by taking actions to make their homes, places of work, schools and businesses as earthquake-safe as possible. We see and report so the Fire Department can decide where to put their limited resources. We learn how to plan at home and work for emergency situations, fire suppression, how to determine degree of structure damage, how to work as a team to search for and extricate the injured and trapped, emergency medical treatment and more. Business owners and residents can benefit from this basic knowledge.

CERT ACTIVITIES – Saturday, April 24th, Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) members attended a training exercise to learn how Monterey will be divided up for quick damage assessment by CERTs after a major event (hurricane, tsunami, earthquake, flood). Fire Chief Mazza introduced CERTs to the new Damage Assessment procedure at this training.

On Saturday, June 26th, CERTs will be activated by the City’s new ESponder system to field test the assessment procedure in neighborhoods. All NERT and CERT personnel are urged to take part.

The New Monterey CERT team (and all NERTs who are interested) will be getting together one evening in May to discuss activation and team building. Date and time TBA.



Once the Hoffman Park CERT box is relocated, the New Monterey CERT team will be actively requesting help to outfit the new CERT box with tools and other supplies.
